

University of Iowa Hawkeye Poll: Iowans' views on gay marriage and civil unions
Topline Results
April 2, 2009

Sample: 978 Iowa adults. Margin of error for the full sample is +/- 3.1 percent.

Question on Support for Gay Marriage in Iowa

Some people say same sex marriage should be allowed because the right to marry is an important civil right for all. Others support same-sex civil unions but oppose gay marriage. And still others oppose both gay marriage and civil unions. What is your position? Do you: support gay marriage, oppose gay marriage but support civil unions, or oppose both gay marriage and civil unions.

Question on Response to Possible Iowa Supreme Court Ruling

Gay marriage is before the Iowa Supreme Court which may rule that the Iowa Constitution requires that gays and lesbians be allowed to marry. If the State Supreme Court decides this way, how should Iowa respond: Amend the state Constitution to ban any same-sex relationship, amend the state Constitution to ban gay marriage but allow civil unions, or accept the Supreme Court's decision and allow gay marriage in Iowa?
